

Item No.	Community Events Announcements Presented by John Pi John Pi presented the Advisory Committee with information regarding the National Children's Study being conducted by Cal State San Bernardino with Dr. Morris as the Principal Investigating Expert. This is a longitudinal study (20 years) funded by the Federal Government. This study will follow subjects (pregnant moms) for 20 years and measure the outcomes with regard to health, children's school outcomes, air quality, community safety and family functioning. This study will give First 5 the opportunity to retrieve data that First 5 could never afford to fund this extensive research by ourselves. 1	Monthly Reimbursement Process
	A detailed analysis and report was presented to the Advisory Committee by First 5 staff member, Cindy Faulkner, Operations Manager. The committee was given a fact sheet for review.
	 Prior to contract year 2010 First 5 San Bernardino would provide funded partner agencies with the following advance payments: 1st Q 40% of their contract term 2nd and 3rd Q 25% of their contact term And the final payment 10% after the final site review for that contact year. Result: Money was owed back to First 5 San Bernardino due to overpayment and disallowances ranging from \$52,689-1,634,033.
	There have been some challenges due to the new reporting monthly invoicing that requires all receipts, billings, and proof of payment by the agencies. Additionally, there have been challenges with the on line Persimmony systems and First 5 work flow. First 5 staff has worked hard to provide technical assistance to agencies and internally the fiscal department has hired an additional accountant.
2	Technical Advisory Committee (TAC)
	A TAC fact sheet and Evaluation & Monitoring Loop sheet was presented to the Advisory Committee by First 5 staff member, John Pi, Supervisor. The committee was given a both sheets for review.
	 The TAC falls under the Advisory Committee governance. The TAC will provide advice, guidance and support for the evaluation team with design and execution of the Commission's evaluation efforts. TAC will create an evaluation framework connected to the strategic plan. Review primary data collection protocols and procedures Input into key evaluation elements of upcoming initiatives Suggest enhancements to current evaluation process Suggest innovative ways to report evaluation results.

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3 School Readiness Review

The School Readiness Initiative Fact Sheet was presented to the Advisory Committee by First 5 staff member, Trinh Wong-McDonald, Staff Analyst II. The committee was given the fact sheet for review.

The California Children and Families Commission adopted the School Readiness Initiative to improve the ability of families, schools, and communities to prepare children to enter school ready to succeed. Incentive matching funds have been made available to County Commissions in order to develop locally tailored programs in communities served by schools primarily in the lowest 3 deciles of the Academic Performance Index (API).

The School Readiness Program funds are obtainable from the State Commission to coordinate, develop, implement, and sustain a system of collaborative school-linked services, programs, and informal supports. These elements are based on research or promising practices to improve school readiness for children, families, communities, and schools.

There have been 2 cycles of funding available through the State Commission that required a one to one match from local commissions. Those funding cycles were:

Cycle 1 2002-07

Cycle 2 2007-11

Due to the state budget the California First 5 Commission will no longer fund the initiative. Local commissions are looking at ways to continue to fund the infrastructure of the current contracts, perhaps at a lower dollar amount. First 5 San Bernardino, barring any take away from available resources, may have available approximately \$3 million for the ECE strategy for FY 2011-2011.

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4 **Harder and Company Evaluation Report**

In 2009-10 Harder & Company collected data for the over \$27 million allocated by First 5 San Bernardino to approximately 95 programs as well as numerous sponsorships and activities.

Harder & Company presented to the Advisory Committee a Health Care Access Impact Report highlighting key findings from multiple data sources. The data took into account services at the client level, the different types of programs invested in and the overall impact of healthcare at the systems level. Harder & Company will be presenting the Annual First 5 San Bernardino report to the Commission at the next scheduled meeting. The report to the Commission will be organized by the five Cluster Areas identified in the Commission's Strategic Plan: Health and Well-Being, Early Care and Education, Family Support, and Systems Integration and Community Engagement.

The types of services provided in the healthcare access strategy were: health insurance, access to a medical home, oral health, prenatal/perinatal care, safety and nutrition. Through these investments First 5 San Bernardino invested in 23 partner agencies and impacted over 35,000 clients.

The Advisory Committee asked the evaluation consultant Harder & Company to frequent the meetings in the near future to give feedback on the other strategies First 5 San Bernardino funds.
