Report – Margaret Hill Advisory Committee Chair The Full Advisory Committee met on August 20 – facilitated in part by Harder and Co.

The Advisory Committee received updates from First 5 staff on the following:

- Status of the First 5 California IMPACT funding;
- Countywide Quality Rating Improvement System (QRIS);
- Current Legislative and Policy issues;
- Strategic Plan review and alignment; and
- Current initiatives and programs funded for Fiscal Year 2015-2016.

Early Learning, Child Health, and Research and Data Subcommittee members met in September and October. They reviewed First 5 initiatives and discussed current services in the fields of early care and education and child wellness.

Based on those discussions, preliminary considerations to formulate recommendations for future strategies from a "systems approach" will be presented for final feedback at the next Advisory Committee Meeting which is scheduled for 11:00 a.m. on Thursday, October 22, 2015 at First 5.

Report – Karen E. Scott Executive Director Sara Elizabeth was born to First 5 San Bernardino's (F5SB) Staff Analyst Jeffrey Pontius and his wife on October 11, weighing 5 pounds. 9 ounces. Family is doing well and Jeffrey is enjoying his paternity leave to get to know his new daughter. Congratulations to Jeffrey.

Annual Audit

As previously shared with the Commission, F5SB's annual audit, which is due to the State Controller's Office by November 1st, has been delayed due to new reporting requirements regarding pensions. F5SB has received acknowledgement and approval from the SCO of a request for extension.

The audit is currently being finalized and will be presented in public forum on November 4, hence the reason for another Commission meeting so close to this one.

Reach Out and Read

The collaborative spirit and leadership of Dr. Edward Curry, President Elect and Dr. Tomas Torices, Executive Director of the American Academy of Pediatrics, California Chapter has been extraordinary.

F5SB and the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) have partnered to bring or expand an early literacy initiative to pediatric practices in San Bernardino County.

Reach Out & Read® is a national program that distributes books and supportive tools and information through pediatricians to connect reading as a vital practice for quality early childhood development - increasing the child's interaction and exposure to words.

Once fully developed this initiative has the potential to reach nearly every child in our County. The "captured audience" is parents bringing their child to a "well-baby check-up." More than 75% of our children routinely complete these well baby checkups on a defined schedule: 6 months, 12 months, 18 months, etc.

Parents of children ages 5 and under will able to take prescribed books home to build their child's library and early literacy capacity and parents will have easily understood tools to support their child's learning.

Data from Reach Out & Read® reports that parents served by the program are four times more likely to read aloud to their children and children served by the program score three to six months ahead of their non-Reach Out & Read peers on vocabulary tests. Currently, there are 612 Reach Out & Read programs in the State of California.

To kick-off this initiative, in partnership with the AAP, F5SB will host an informational dinner for pediatricians, pediatric sub-specialists and pediatric medical representatives to introduce the Reach Out and Read program and gain commitment to participate from this local medical community.

This event entitled *ROAR & Explore the Possibilities!* is scheduled for Thursday, November 5, 2015 at our F5SB office and is limited to the first 65 physicians that register. An additional event targeting the High Desert region is being planned as well.

The objectives of Reach Out and Read fold well into other "systems building" activities happening throughout the County such as First 5's *Talk.Read.Sing* promotion, the Vision2Read campaign, the IREAD collaborative, (formerly First Book) and a host of possibilities through County libraries, Preschool Services, the Housing Authority, public schools, and early care and education settings embedded in our QRIS work.

They will review existing data, analyze gaps and services and identify federal, state and local funding for leveraging opportunities. The deadline for making recommendations and finalizing priorities is October 15.

Next meeting is scheduled for 11:00 a.m. on October 22, 2015 at First 5.

Report – Karen E. Scott Executive Director

Commission Meeting

The next regular Commission meeting is scheduled for October 21st. The October meeting is held late in the month to accommodate the required presentation of the audit findings and the annual report. The annual report must contain the expenditure figures from the audit. Both are due to the State of California by November 1st.

For the Fiscal Year 2014-2015 audit there is a new accounting pronouncement that is required to be implemented called GASB 68. GASB 68 requires entities to give more detail and to book the liability on pensions. This is required of everyone. There has been a delay in obtaining the required information from the County related to First 5's pension amounts and status. There is a possibility that the audit may not be completed for the October 21 Commission meeting. The County is aware of the State deadline and is expediting the information as quickly as possible. The auditors are also aware of the situation. The consequence for the Commission for not getting the audit and annual report submitted to the State on time is a possible delay in receiving our next revenue allotment. If a delay is unavoidable, Commissioners will be notified and staff will present both reports at the November 4 meeting.

Legislative Updates

While recently consulting with the County's Director of Governmental and Legislative Affairs, Ms. Scott shared information with Commissioners related to concerns regarding SBX2 13 - a new tobacco measure recently introduced that <u>does not contain backfill language</u>. Authors of such bills have previously discussed their intent and proposed content with First 5 CA or the First 5 Association and those proposals have always included backfill language for Prop 10 and the other tobacco tax funded programs.

First 5 Association advocates have now informed Commissions that assurances have been received by the legislative leadership that the backfill WILL be in the new tobacco tax bill (Pan/Hernandez) if it moves forward. First 5 California and the First 5 Association are holding off on any position on the bill until the next revised version.

Legislative leaders have stated that the \$2 Tobacco Tax bill will not move forward until other Special Session bills have shown promise on the Assembly floor.

The focus now is on three key bills that legislative leaders have identified as threshold tests for moving forward. Over the next week, First 5 Advocates will be carefully tracking the following SBX 2 bills:

- SBX2 5 (Mark Leno)/ABX2 6 (Jim Cooper) Adds e-cigarettes to existing tobacco products definition
- SBX2 7 (Ed Hernandez)/ABX2 8 (Jim Wood) Increases age of sale for tobacco products to 21
- SBX2 9 (Mike McGuire)/ABX2 10 (Richard Bloom) Allows local jurisdictions to tax tobacco

Legislators will be looking to First 5 to reinforce support positions on these bills. The ability to demonstrate interest of First 5's to support these bills on tobacco/e-cigarette regulation and local control will directly impact the ability to engage on amendments to the tobacco tax bill. In short, First 5 CA, First 5 Association and Commissions that are able are aiming to show a strong First 5 voice to demonstrate the power of the First 5 movement. First 5 CA and the First 5 Association support the Regulation of E-Cigarettes.

First 5 Association does a wonderful job serving all Commissions in advocating for the Prop 10 program – for our children ages prenatal through age 5.

The following fact sheets will be placed on the First 5 website: "The Time to Reinvest in the First 5 Years is Now" and "Investing in California's Children".

Countywide Vision - Vision2Read

The Countywide Vision Education Element Group, led by County Superintendent of Schools Ted Alejandre and CSUSB President Tomás Morales, has taken the lead in addressing the regional goal to partner with all sectors of the community to support the success of every child from cradle to career. This goal began with development of our "Cradle to Career Roadmap" that identifies key milestones in every child's academic and social journey toward a career.

The Education Element Group, with support from the other Vision Element Groups, has developed the <u>Vision2Read</u> initiative as a year-long campaign that will focus the entire community around importance of literacy and encourage us to ensure that all of our children have the opportunity to become proficient readers.

On Saturday, September 19, from 8 a.m. – 1 p.m., SBCSS and CSUSB will kick off the Vision2Read Initiative at its Annual Family Reading Rally at the College of Education. We ask that you join us to promote literacy in our county and encourage teachers, parents, students and the community to attend the event.

CA Children Need a Strong Early Learning Plan

One of the most alarming statistics is the extent to which poverty impacts the growing number of children in the Southern California region. About a quarter of California's children live within families without enough resources to make ends meet at a basic level. First 5 recently received an inquiry from a concerned citizen about what the Commission is doing to support families living in tragic circumstances.

Although First 5 programs and services are not "means-tested", public assistance or necessarily geared to low-income, disadvantaged children and families, the fact of the matter and the data we collect indicates that the Commission's investment serves just such children as the largest population.

First 5 seeks to identify root causes of issues affecting children's development and optimal well-being and apply evidenced-based solutions that generate positive outcomes. Research suggests that poverty in the first few years of life may undermine brain development, adversely affect overall health status, and lead to both diminished

success in early elementary school grades, and lower chances of ever completing high school

Compared to their peers, children living in poverty are more likely to have physical health problems such as low birth weight or lead poisoning, and are also more likely to have behavioral and emotional problems.

Children living in poverty also tend to exhibit cognitive difficulties, as shown in achievement test scores, and are less likely to complete basic education.

First 5's across the State, facing similar concerns, often strategize and share solutions to improve Child Outcomes. The article in this month's ED report is one such "share point" – the idea of developing a strong, state-wide comprehensive Early Learning Plan to benefit all children to include voluntary home visiting for new and expecting parents, universal developmental screening and interventions for infants and toddlers and establishing a statewide kindergarten readiness assessment tool to help us measure (and respond) whether children are equipped and ready to enter and succeed in school. This is the mantra and mission of First 5's and our contribution to breaking the cycle of poverty. It is refreshing to acknowledge that California State leaders are moving in the direction of making our children the State's number one priority.

Inland Empire United Way is a valuable partner in addressing the County's poverty issues and serving as the resource and referral solution for families in need. IEUW also shares a common goal of improving health and education for low income children and vulnerable families.

Linda Haugan, Commission Chair and Ms. Scott have had the pleasure of working with Greg Bradbard through a collaborative association called Funder's Alliance. Mr. Bradbard shared his report "Struggling to Get By – The Real Cost Measure in California". Ms. Scott asked Mr. Bradbard to share highlights with the Commission as a special presentation at today's Commission meeting.

Talk. Read. Sing Messaging Campaign

The "All Aboard the Reading Railroad" event is now the "Talk.Read.Sing Fest" and it will be held in Hesperia in October and in Redlands in November. Page 3 of the ED report provides valuable information about early developmental screening including the American Academy of Pediatrics recommendations to address the 61% of surveyed children who are underscreened.

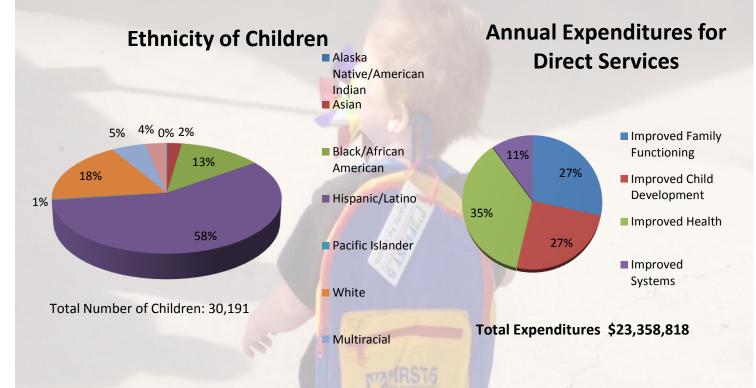

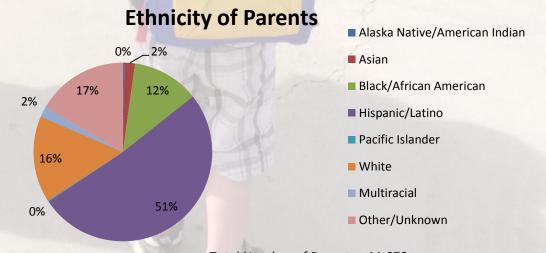

2014-2015 Annual Report Narratives

First 5 San Bernardino aims to promote, support and enhance the health and early development of children prenatal through age five and their families and communities. This is accomplished through investments in the areas of health, family support and early education as well as support for systems improvement and capacity building efforts in the county of San Bernardino.

Fiscal Year 2014-2015 yielded many notable accomplishments and positive outcomes for our youngest residents and their families. One of the most significant investments was 586 participants in a family literacy initiative yielding increased parent perceptions of their abilities to actively support and enhance their children's love for reading. Data from this initiative demonstrated that a significant number of parents who, prior to the program, rarely or never practiced important behaviors with their children such as reading together, following a reading (bedtime, etc.) routine, practicing the alphabet, singing songs and playing rhyming games began to practice these behaviors regularly as assessed through a standardized evaluation tool.

Other highlights that took place in 2014-2015 were:

- A comprehensive year round preschool experience for 984 children
- Asthma stabilization and education provided to 327 children and their caregivers
- \bullet Oral Health Screenings for 8,300 children and treatment provided to 1,300 children
- Successful Literacy, Water Safety and Oral Health Campaigns
- Developmental screenings provided to 4,834 children countywide

Background Information

At the July 8, 2015 Commission meeting, specifics relating to the IMPACT program and its funding opportunity were presented and approval was received to submit a Letter of Intent (LOI) to participate in the First 5 IMPACT program. The LOI was submitted on July 13th. The next step requires completion of the application.

The application is a two-phase process. Specifics about the Phase 1 application, which determines eligibility to "base-layer funding" was shared with the Commission on August 5, 2015. Potential base-layer funding for San Bernardino County is \$2,241,758 over a five-year period with a complete QRIS plan and successful application. First 5 San Bernardino (F5SB) serves as the Lead Agency for the San Bernardino County QRIS Consortium. The Phase 1 application was completed and submitted in August 2015. On September 24, 2015, F5SB was notified by First 5 CA that the Phase 1 application had been approved via an Intent to Award notice. (See Attachment A)

Phase 2 of the application is due December 11, 2015. Currently, there is no scheduled Commission meeting planned before the new year. Although no Commission approval is required of the application, F5SB staff would like to inform the Commission of the status of the Phase 2 application.

Phase 2 of the application is referred to as the First 5 IMPACT High-Quality Action Plan – Implementation Step Layer Funding. (See Form 3 – Action Plan Template – Attachment B). This Action Plan includes a description of how First 5 IMPACT funds will support the implementation of a local CA-QRIS. This includes the Design and Systems Functions, Partnership Commitments, Local Governance and Strategic Financing.

As the Lead Agency, F5SB together with the QRIS Consortium is finalizing that First 5 IMPACT High-Quality Action Plan. The San Bernardino County QRIS Consortium has committed to achieving the components included in Step 3 for both the Rating Matrix and Continuous Quality Improvement Pathways. (see page 9 of Attachment B) The Rating Matrix addresses such elements as Child Development and School Readiness through Child Observation, Developmental and Health Screenings as well as Teacher Qualifications, Effective Teacher Child Interactions, Optimal Early Learning Environments, including ratios and group size. The Continuous Quality Improvement Pathways provides tools and resources to establish and meet goals related to School Readiness and Teacher Qualifications and also guides work related to Social-Emotional Development and Health, Nutrition and Physical Activity

all to be included in a successful QRIS Implementation Plan. In addition to the Action Plan, the Consortium is developing a Five-Year IMPACT budget along with establishing performance measures.

With a successful IMPACT application, it is anticipated that F5SB will receive an estimated award of \$3,205,839 over a five year period of time. Notification of an "Intent to Award" is scheduled for January 2016 with awards expected to be received beginning February 2016.

First 5 IMPACT funding will be utilized as a leveraged resource to support quality improvement work through a system and mission developed and coordinated by the QRIS Consortium.

This application is in support of F5SB's Strategic Plan, SPA 2: Systems and Networks wherein F5SB is providing leadership in the development of this QRIS – a system that supports children prenatal through age 5, and results in sustainable and collective impact.
